DROP-OUT PREVENTION

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Walthall County Demographic Information

The Walthall County School District is located in Walthall County, Mississippi. Named after Civil War general and Mississippi Senator Edward C. Walthall, the county is situated in southwest Mississippi, about equidistant between Jackson, Mississippi and New Orleans, Louisiana. According to the Walthall County Chamber of Commerce website, "Walthall County is home to 15,000+ residents who contribute to the area's rich agricultural history, from cotton farming, dairy and poultry production, to the abundant pine harvesting." It has a population of 14,812 people with a median age of 40.3 and a median household income of \$30,571. The population of Walthall County, MS is 52.7% White, 45.7% Black, and 0.63% other.



Less than 2% of the people in Walthall County speak a non-English language, and 99% are U.S. citizens. Major industries include mining, quarrying, agriculture, forestry, and recreation. The poverty rate was estimated at 24.1% in 2016. Within Walthall County School District, as reported by the *Small Area Income and Poverty Estimate* from the U.S. Census Bureau, about 36.1% of children between ages 5 and 17 live in poverty-related households.

- 3. Developing dropout recovery initiatives that focus on students age seventeen (17) through twenty-one (21), who dropped out of school (i.e., Mississippi Works).
- 4. Addressing how students will transition to the home school district from the juvenile detention centers.




